#### Kahnawà:ke's Shared Vision Statement

In 2029, Kahnawa'kehró:non know, understand and live our roles and responsibilities as Onkwehón:we. Onkwehonwe'né:ha (Kanien'ké:ha) is the main language of communication in the home and community. Through our language and the daily practice of our culture we promote our strong collective identity. Kaianere'kó:wa with its teachings of skén:nen, ka'sestéhnshera and kahni'konrí:io are our guiding principles.

Kahnawà:ke is a socially, politically and spiritually unified community. All Kahnawa'kehró:non respectfully co-exist harmoniously and peacefully in a clean and safe environment. We are a community of close-knit families maintaining our connection with each other; where elders are admired, treasured and called upon; where children are safe, provided guidance and loved. We are well on the path to healthy mind, body and spirit. We live and teach our spirituality through our ceremonies and festivals as a way of elevating our spirit.

Kahnawà:ke is an independent self-governing community in control of our opportunities. All people are treated equally. The people are the government and have a voice in the direction of the future. We are an economically self-sufficient community with an expanded land base, where individuals are provided opportunities and encouraged to succeed. All Kahnawa'kehró:non are well- and fully-educated in mainstream and Onkwehón:we philosophies, confident in who we are.

We live in respectful co-existence with the peoples of the world and Mother Earth. We protect and defend our determination and territory with decisions based on our principles. We are proud and confident about our future.

# **PRIORITY AREAS**

In 2019, KCI's Steering Committee members presented the following six (6) priority areas to community members.

- Language and Culture
- Food Sovereignty
- Wholistic Health and Wellness for Youth
- Community Plan to fulfill our shared visions
- Economic Development Strategy
- Kahwá:tsire a family resource for new and expecting parents

In 2019 at the Community Open House, community members further identified 3 priority areas as starting points for KCl's work. Through Action Teams, significant advancements have been made in a number of these priority areas.

#### The first three Action Teams were launched in early 2020:

Food Sovereignty, Language & Culture, and Wholistic Health & Wellness for Youth.

By the end of 2020, the Community Plan to fulfil our shared vision became the 4th active priority area. The following pages describe the progress that has been made over the course of the year starting from April 1st, 2022 to March 31st, 2023.

# Language & Culture

#### LANGUAGE AND CULTURE ACTION TEAM

- From April 1st, 2021-March 31st, 2022, the Language and Culture Action Team met a total of 18 times.
- The Action Team had 6 active members from 2022-2023, consisting of one dedicated elder from the community, and other community members.

#### LANGUAGE AND CULTURE MENTORSHIP PROGRAM

The work of the Language & Culture Action Team has been centered around the planning, development, implementation, and evaluation of the 2<sup>nd</sup> year of the Pilot Language and Culture Mentorship Program.

The purpose of the Language and Culture Mentorship Program is to facilitate learning through interaction, collaboration, communication, and a team approach to language and culture learning and documentation. Each team is composed of advanced second language learners (apprentices) with first-language speakers(Masters). An objective of the program is to transmit valuable language and culture knowledge and sustain language and culture fluency in the community. Master-apprentice teams meet on their own time, pace, setting and schedule.

#### Community Meeting

July 21st, 2022 - In preparation for the Language & Culture Mentorship 2022 Launch, the Language & Culture Action Team hosted a Community Meeting to invite interested people within the community to be a part of the action team, as well for the community to see what the Language & Culture Action Team and the Kahnawake Collective Impact does. The event included a catered lunch, a short presentation by the Language & Culture Coordinator and Action Team Chairperson, and ended with open discussion and question period.

#### **Evaluation:**

- Twelve Community members attended the meeting
- One Elder joined the Action Team out of the event
- Positive verbal feedback about the Language & Culture Mentorship program; that it is a great initiative and important to include the Elders in community activities.
- Our Chairperson, Ohontsakéhte Montour, was very supportive and made sure we kept the meeting's goal at the head of discussion

Language & Culture Mentorship Program -Implementation & Launch October 15th, 2022

Ahead of the official launch date, an in-person or phone call meet-up between a first-language/advanced kanien'kéha speaking elder (mentor) and second-language Kanien'kéha learner (mentee) orientation process was conducted. The meet-ups would be used for the mentee to personally document their learned language experiences from Elders, while preserving and passing on language and culture teachings while engaging with Elders and creating networks of Language Speakers.

The October 15th Launch included a brunch & Tobacco burning for all the participants, as a way for all the participants to gather and voice their comments & concerns.

# THE KANIEN'KÉHA LANGUAGE & CULTURE MENTORSHIP PROGRAM

#### **Evaluation:**

- Difficulty confirming Elder Mentors due to a few reasons
  - o Scheduling, elders tend to be busy and committed to other activities (professional or social)
  - Fear or hesitation with the idea of "teaching", as they do not want to be put in the position of creating curriculum
  - Lack of physical mobility and accessibility to transportation
- 11 registrations
- 9 accepted and paired
- 8 completed the program

#### SPIRIT OF WELLNESS MONTH PRESENTATION

by Wendy Hill: Peaceful Relationships

November 20th, 2022 - In collaboration with KSCS's Spirit of Wellness month and The Language & Culture Mentorship program, Traditional Healer and author Wendy Hill presented a talk at the 207 Longhouse. The topic was to promote strong family bonds and self-healing through traditional perspective.

#### **Evaluation:**

71 registrations and 49 attendees, would be considered positive/high participation. There was a survey sent to those participants who gave their emails. Lots of positive verbal feedback was gathered after the event asking for more workshops/presentations similar to this event and their gratitude for hosting these traditional healing workshops.

#### OTHER LANGUAGE & CULTURE ACTIVITIES IN THE 2021-2022 FISCAL YEAR

Entewakaratonnion: REEL TALK film screening event (April 2022)



As an event for Cultural Awareness month, the Language and Culture action team collaborated with KORLCC, IsumaTV, and National Film Board of Canada to present a viewing of "Mary Two-Axe Earley: I am Indian again", a film by Kahnawà:ke's own Courtney Montour, as well as some other short films by Indigenous writers and producers.

Before the films started, a discussion panel took place with film makers Lucy Tulugarjuk, Sonia Bonspille Boileau, and Angie Pepper O'bomsawin, talking about

their experiences in the film industry as women, and as Indigenous women.






Courtney Montour ended the evening with a Q&A session about her showcased film. The viewing was available in both Kanien'kéha and English, and brought out a number of community members, for a packed house at KCI.

#### Kanien'ké:ha Self-Guided Language Group (May 2022)

The 8 week, Self-Guided Language Group launched in May 2022. Over 100 applications were received, and majority of the applicants were between the ages of 20 and 49 years old, with little-to-no experience with Kanien'kéha learning. KCl provided a free textbook and learning materials. The entire group took place online through weekly zoom sessions, and a Facebook group for further discussions, questions, and conversations.





Collaboration with KCI Youth Ambassadors for the Thrivin' & Archivin' Scrapbook Event (February 2023)

The students and mentors of the Language and Culture Mentorship Program collaborated with the youth in KCl's Youth Ambassadors program for the scrapbooking event called "Thrivin' & Archivin". This activity was planned with the goal of bringing elders and youth together in a shared activity to strengthen relationships and build connections. The students and mentors jumped in on the fun and attended the workshop together.

#### **FOOD SOVEREIGNTY ACTIVITIES IN 2022-2023**

#### Grocery Gift Card Giveaway

KCI purchased gift cards from President's Choice redeemable locally at Maxi & Club Entrepot and also from Mohawk Market to support local business. These gift cards were given away during K103's Family Picnic event on June 24<sup>th</sup> 2022 at the sports complex grounds. Community members who visited the KCI booth and listened to a brief presentation on the activities of KCI were given a grocery gift card, one per household. Data was collected on the number of elders, adults and children in each household to determine reach.

80 households Total 180 adults 25 of which were elders 65+ 102 children



#### Reconnecting to Traditional Foods

On June 30th 2022, Community members were invited to pick up a

free hot meal cooked by Screaming Chef Cuisine using traditional ingredients. Delivery was provided to elders and those with mobility issues. Approximately 200 meals were served. The meals consisted of Corn Soup, Roasted



squash with a moose meat gravy, roasted squash seeds, corn on the cob and strawberry juice.

86% of community members who received the meals were above the age of 50.

#### Kateri Food Basket Donation

On August 12<sup>th</sup> 2022, \$1500 worth of non-perishable foods from Club Entrepot was purchased and delivered to the Kateri Food Basket by KCl staff members.

- 218 litres of canned tomatoes, tomato sauce, beans, vegetable & chicken soups
- 276 lbs of tuna, oatmeal, spaghetti and rice
- 68 cartons of milk

#### Community Fall Fest

On October 15<sup>th</sup> 2022 the Food Sovereignty Action Team held a community Fall Fest in collaboration with Kahnawake Tourism. A traditional meal was cooked on-site by Chef Tawnya Brant to celebrate the harvest season and offer a space for community members to trade excess produce and hand made crafts. Over 600 community members attended this event.

#### Ice fishing "from drill to grill"

On January 4<sup>th</sup> & March 2<sup>nd</sup> the Food Sovereignty Action Team held 2 separate ice fishing events, a total of 20 participants were able to learn how to safely ice fish & cook their catch.







#### Seed Conference

On March 25<sup>th</sup> & 26<sup>th</sup> the Food Sovereignty Action Team in collaboration with Chief Stephen McComber held the 2<sup>nd</sup> annual Seed Conference at La Vista Restaurant. A total of 60 community members attended the 2-day event. Topics that were covered were Permaculture, Integrated Pest Management, Seed Keeping, Microgreens, city/municipal growing programs and garlic.

## Wholistic Health & Wellness Initiative for Youth

#### WHOLISTIC HEALTH & WELLNESS FOR YOUTH ACTION TEAM

- Number of Action Team members (active): 6
- Number of Meetings that were held: 21
- The Wholistic Health and Wellness for Youth Action Team members have changed over the 2022-2023 fiscal year. The Action Team is comprised of two groups of youth: high school aged youth, and adult youth who are employed, or are students. Scheduling meetings where everyone can attend has been a challenge. The Action Team needs more support in terms of planning and programming for events of all scales.

#### WHOLISTIC HEALTH & WELLNESS FOR YOUTH ACTIVITIES IN 2022-2023

Two-Spirit, IndigiQueer, LGBT Movie Screening Event

In August 2022, the action team held the "Two-Spirit, IndigiQueer Movie Night," that took place on a local beach. There were a few different organizations, businesses, and community members that donated in-kind support - the

location, equipment to play the movies (high quality projector, outdoor inflatable screen), wifi hotspot, and some of the snacks. It was our largest turnout of an event by this action team, and community members of all ages came. The films shown were either directed by Indigenous directors, or contained Indigenous actors, on the theme of 2SLGBTQ issues. Partners for the event were Thrifting the Night Away, James Day, KFiber Internet, and Mohawk Council of Kahnawà:ke for the use of Tekakwitha Island Beach.

Youth Vision Statement

From June to September 2022, youth as part of KCl's Wholistic Health and Wellness for Youth explored the purpose of our action team, and decided to re-look at the "who, what, why, when and how" to help us re-focus on our purpose. After reading the Community Vision Statement, and through a number of working sessions in person and virtually, over 10 action team members, all youth 12-35, contributed to the development of a one-page visioning statement for the action team - description, common goal, review of guiding values.

"Kahnawake youth are the future and tending to their wholistic wellbeing is to invest in making our community stronger and healthier. As young people, we understand what is best for us and when we are heard we can more meaningfully engage in our community roles. For this reason, our work focuses on creating safe and positive environments where youth can grow, learn new things, and feel empowered to use their voice to create change,"

#### Youth Summit (Kahnawà:ke Collective Impact & Kahnawà:ke Survival School)

Kahnawà:ke Collective Impact collaborated with Kahnawake Survival School to host a two-day youth summit on Thursday March 23<sup>rd</sup> and Friday March 24<sup>th</sup> 2023. The Youth Summit included 6 Kahnawake youth speakers, most of

whom were KSS graduates. The Summit also had arts-based workshops, and spaces for discussion on the themes of identity, wholistic health and wellness, and future success. We had 36 youth sign up and had 25 youth per day on average attending. Staff at KSS are already excited to see this event happen again next year. Multiple youth gave the feedback that they "enjoyed everything, wouldn't change a thing" about the summit. We had high attendance from young men, which is not something we see a lot of. We



heard youth say for the future they want more arts facilities, the return of traditional government, land back, and that parts of this summit "reminded them how lucky they are to live in Kahnawà:ke".





#### **OTHER ACTIVITIES**

Entewakaratonnion' Reek Talk! Onkwehon:we women changing the lens of filmmaking

The Wholistic Health and Wellness for youth team collaborated with the Language and Culture Action Team Coordinator to host and set-up for this event.

#### Youth Voices

The Wholistic Health and Wellness team took the lead on the hosting and leading the Youth Voices discussion groups for MyKahnawà:ke Community Planning. Some of the sessions took places in the high schools (Kahanwà:ke Survival School, and Howard S. Billings High School).

#### Walgwan Center hosted by Kahnawake Collective Impact

February 23<sup>rd</sup> 2023. KCI hosted the Walgwan Center which is a drug and alcohol treatment center in Gesgapegiag, Quebec that is rooted in Mi'kmaq culture. Walgwan Center staff shared how they support wholistic health and wellness for youth through programming and addiction rehabilitation. KCI shared how we engage with youth, as well as the larger Kahnawake context around addictions for a meaningful discussion.

# Community Plan to Fulfill our Shared Vision

#### MY KAHNAWÀ:KE

In late 2020, the KCI Steering Committee made the decision to start its fourth priority area: the development of a Community Plan to Fulfil Our Shared Vision. The need to begin this work came through the acknowledgement of and alignment with similar work already being conducted through Comprehensive Community Planning, now renamed MyKahnawake. Thus far, KCI's contributions have predominantly been focused on participating in and coordinating with existing efforts.

#### Youth Voices

In February 2022, KCI started Youth Voices, a monthly discussion forum for Kahnawake Youth to have discussions on various topics in the community. The topics follow the Kahnawake Portfolio Structure.

#### The topics covered were:

- Governance & decision making
- History and governance in Kahnawà:ke
- Health: physical activity and nutrition, treatment and prevention of health, emotional and spiritual health, pre/post natal health and midwifery
- Public safety & Emergency services
- Housing
- Spaces and places for youth



Although not all sessions were well-attended, any data

that was gathered through these sessions will be used to produce a Youth Voices Report and will be shared directly with a number of stakeholders. KCI decided to discontinue the sessions for the 2023-2024 year.

# KAHNAWÀ:KE COLLECTIVE IMPACT PROJECTS

# **Youth Ambassadors**

The Youth Ambassadors pilot program took place from October 2022 to January 2023. Through Kahnawà:ke Collective Impact, Youth Ambassadors was a 10 week program for youth originally 18-24, to provide a paid opportunity for Kahnawakeh'ró:non to learn about community work, event planning, and the three priority areas at KCI: Language and Culture, Food Sovereignty, and Wholistic Health and Wellness for Youth.



Youth were asked to come for two hours per week, for 10 weeks. Initially the program began with 6 youth, with 3 completing the program. The youth thought of, planned, and carried out an intergenerational scrapbooking event called




'Thrivin' and Archivin' for youth and elders in the community. The youth were supported by the Youth Projects Coordinator and the Language and Culture Coordinator when needed. The event took place on February 2<sup>nd</sup> 2023.

# KCI Kindled: creating space for meaningful dialogue

In September 2022, Kahnawà:ke Collective Impact started their first podcast KCI Kindled: creating space for meaningful dialogue. The goal of the podcast was create a forum for community members to discuss and have a conversation about a broad range of topics related to our community. The four episode pilot series is available across most Podcast platforms, as well as on Youtube.

#### **Episode 1: Residential Schools**

Special guest, Wahéhshon Whitebean, joins hosts for a personal conversation about residential schools and it's impact on our community and families.

#### Episode 2: Kahnawà:ke Spooky Stories




#### **Episode 3: Working towards Wellness**

# **Healing Through Performance Art Program**

In January 2023, 'Healing Through Performance Art' began. The program was a 19-session program for youth in Kahnawà:ke that used performance art and creative art as a tool to promote health, healing and well-being.


The program began with a registration, as holding the same group of individuals has it's benefits for the group to build trusting connections with each other, which supports emotional well-being. We had 8 community youth who had registered, but as participation dropped the program shifted from registration-based programming to drop-in, open-to-all community youth activities.



The program closed by inviting all of Kahnawà:ke's youth to submit art for a finale Vernissage and Open Mic Performance. The Event took place at La Vista Restaurant over two evenings toward the end of February and was a huge success.

Through this program, participants received the opportunity to explore different art and performance art techniques through workshops culminating in a final art exhibit to share their work. 




- 4 5 active members

#### PLANNED ACTIVITIES FOR 2023-2024 FISCAL YEAR

This strategic planning will continue into the summer of 2023 with the goal of evaluating and revisiting KCI's mission, values, objectives through in-house workshops and community engagement opportunities. This is an exciting time, as it will be the first time KCI is doing strategic planning since its inception.

- via an open house to revisit its initiatives and have the community's input

#### **WELCOMING NEW SUPPORT STAFF**


2022-23 marked an important milestone for KCI's support staff. For the first time, KCI had a full team dedicated to supporting not only the administrative needs, but also further assistance to support the initiative work.

#### **CHANGES IN SUPPORT STAFF**

KCI also experienced a change in project directional leadership in early 2023. We welcomed Lou Ann Stacey as the new Project Director for Kahnawà:ke Collective Impact. This past fiscal year proved to be big year in terms of sourcing funds and growing our team's capacity, and keeping the overall project moving forward, hard work and dedication from our directors will always be appreciated!





#### TRAINING & CAPACITY BUILDING

#### Trauma Informed Care (May 2022)

Kahnawà:ke Collective Impact hosted a 2 day training workshop on Trauma-Informed Care, facilitated by Suzy Goodleaf, Nancy Rother, and Linda Delormier. The workshop was opened to all members of KCI, as well as the community. Topics included the understanding of trauma, and its multi-generational effects, collective trauma and a stage of re-entry and recovery. The participation on both days was exceptional and gave the opportunity to examine and create places of safety within our community.

#### Statistics Canada Training (Fall 2022)

KCI Support Staff received training from Statistics Canada on two different areas: Surveys and using the Excel spreadsheet program on Windows computers.

- 'Surveys from start to finish" 3 days of online training as a group. It covered the creation of surveys with intention, methods of receiving responses to surveys, data collection, and using the survey to tell a story. This was an excellent opportunity for KCI staff to learn how to produce more effective surveys in the future.
- 'Introduction to Excel' 2 days of online training as a group. This looked at the basics of creating spreadsheets using Microsoft Excel, and how to use the basic features like functions, creating drop-down menus, and creating charts and diagrams from the information.

#### PLANNED ACTIVITIES FOR 2022-2023 FISCAL YEAR

- With the guidance of the final report from KCI's strategic plan, we hope to grow and streamline KCI's internal capacity depending on the needs of the initiatives and the direction KCI will take in the next 3-5 years.
- Increase learning opportunities for personal and professional development courses/workshops.
- Growth for KCI in terms of communications and awareness campaigns to draw more participation from the community in the Steering Committee, Action Teams, and possible new staff.



  - These social media engagement posts have been shared widely and have been very successful at promoting healthy discussing and information



#### **HEALING ARTS PROJECT**


